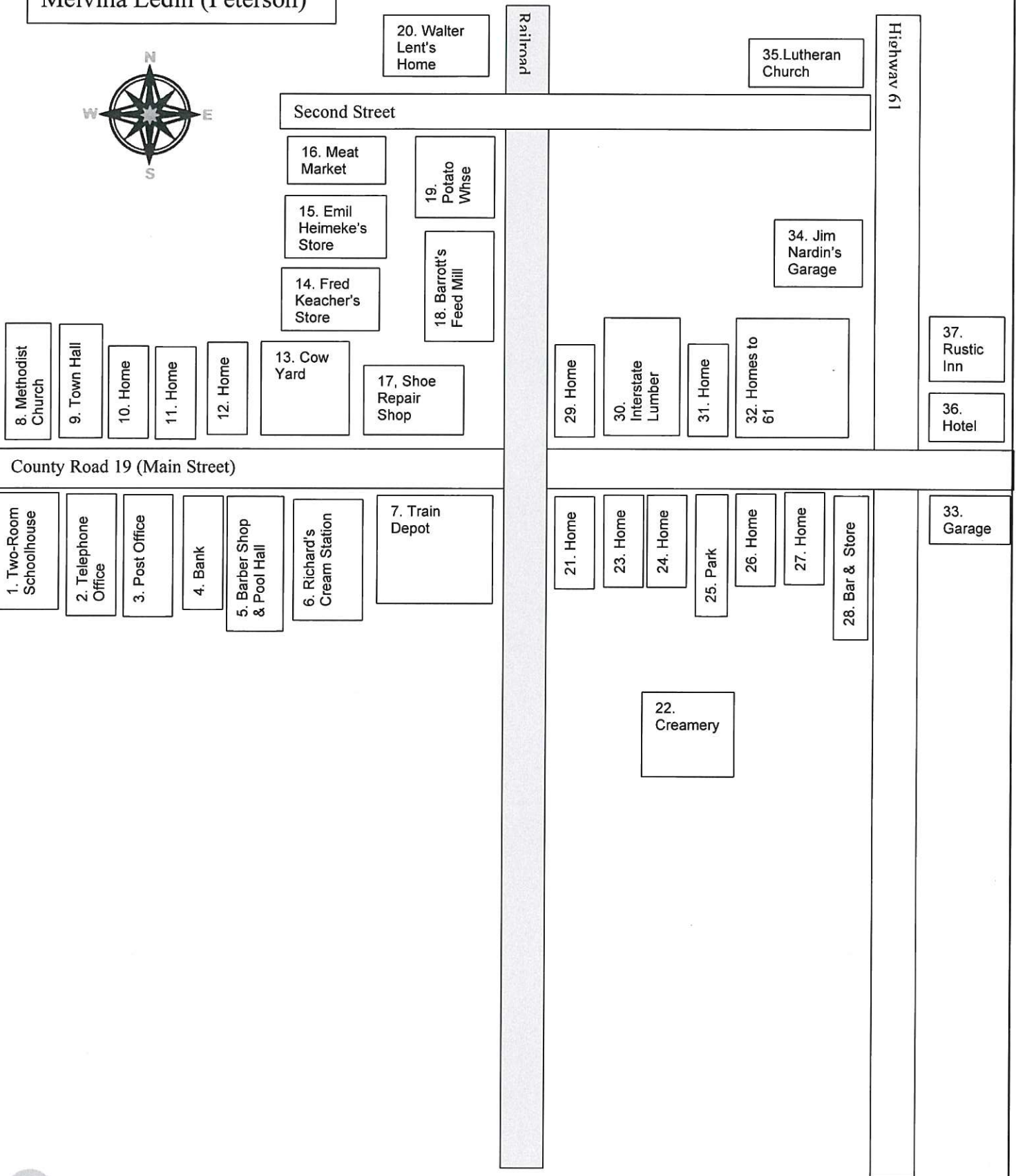


Map of Stacy about 1932

Description of Map as Remembered by Melvina Ledin (Peterson)

1	Two Room Schoolhouse
2	Telephone Office – Hyacinth Olson, Operator
3	Post Office – Carl Johnson, Postmaster
4	Bank – this building is now an antique store (2013)
5	Patak's Barber Shop and Bar
6	Richard's Cream Station
7	Train Depot
8	Methodist Church
9	Town Hall: during WW2 there as a dance there every Saturday night. Larry Frenning played there many times, as well as Kermit Stone, also some men from Sunrise had a little band which played; everyone from the area came to dance. I think the admittance was 25 cents. My Dad, Malcolm Peterson, was one of the men that put the floor in the hall, it was a very nice dance floor. He was a carpenter as well as a farmer, and helped build several houses in the area.
10	Private Home
11	Private Home
12	Private Home – This was the Patak's home
13	Walter Lent's cow yard. His farm land came right into town right north of County Road 19 and Main Street
14	Fred Keacher's store, it originally had another name, before my time.
15	Emil Hemieke's Store
16	Oscar Rieck's Meat Market
17	A little shoe repair shop – later was a post office
18	Barrott's Feed Mill
19	Potato Warehouse – Farmer's stored their potatoes there
20	Walter Lent's House, it is still there (2013)
21	Dell Lent's home – where the park is now (2013)
22	The creamery which later was made into a home by Ernie Anderson. In the 20's and 30's all the farmers brought their cream there. The butter was made right there and the farmer got their butter there instead of the grocery store.
23	Private Home
24	Private Home
25	The Park. Every summer there would be a carnival in the park, a Ferris Wheel, Merry-go-Round, etc. A thrill for the country kids.

27	Private Home
28	Frank Wilcox's bar and store. This was the Greyhound bus stop in Stacy, as well as a beer bar and light groceries, such as cold cuts, ice cream and nickel ice cream cones!!
29	Private Home
30	Interstate Lumber Co. It has been remodeled into a home now.
31	The house where the people that ran the lumber company always lived.
32	Private homes to the highway
33	Garage
34	Jim Nardin's garage
35	The Lutheran Church
36	Hotel, in later years it was used as a home
37	The Rustic Inn. It was first a beer joint before Stanley and Edna Olson made a restaurant out of it
